Presidents Report

What an exciting time for AFI Victoria, our very first Newsletter. It's hard to believe we are already nearly half way through the year, and what a year it has been. We kicked it off with the official launch of our Foundry Apprenticeship Training Program with our training partner GoTafe.

This was such an exciting time for the industry in Victoria as we have been without an official local Apprenticeship Training Organisation for many years. I am pleased to report that many of the companies who committed to employing and training new apprentices have now signed up and we have 8 out of the minimum 15 apprentices already well underway training in their first 3 units.

In March, we held our first of several planned combined meetings with ADCA, a presentation by Matt Ferns from Sun Metals. This Qld based Zn refinery have addressed the issue of extraordinarily high and continually increasing power costs by building a 125MW solar farm to lower costs. The ground-breaking project marked the first large-scale solar farm built directly by a major energy user in Australia and signalled the start of the shift of Australian heavy industry away from "baseload" coal power and to renewable energy.

Our most recent meeting was a plant visit to Albins Performance Transmissions at their new premises. Albins specialise in the design and manufacture of drivetrain components for high performance applications. They are a full-service supplier and pride themselves on the partnerships they create with their customers and suppliers alike. A 30-year history of supply to global markets of extreme duty driveline applications, Albins is the largest high-performance

transmission manufacturer in the Southern hemisphere. Not even the wet and frosty Ballarat winter kept our enthusiastic members from this highly informative tour.

AFI National

The AFI has branches in Qld, NSW, WA, SA and Victoria. Each of these branches operates autonomously. The AFI National Executive consists of a Secretary / Treasurer (Joe Vecchio) and President (Alan Cooke). We have 2 face to face meetings with State representatives each year – March in Adelaide, and October wherever the National Conference is being held.

There are 3 major issues that are common across our industry – access to skilled personnel, training of apprentices and technicians, and soaring electricity costs.

A major activity in recent months has been the collation and distribution of the Industry Report. This report gives an overview of the casting industry in Australia. Basic data reported includes tonnage of metal cast, number of employee's and dollar value of castings sold.

Another major and ongoing activity this year has been to engage with politicians and advocacy groups in the search for relief from the soaring electricity costs. In recent weeks we have been successful in engaging Tennant Reed (Principal National Advisor – Public Policy, AI Group) to advise and advocate on our behalf. His activity is opening doors and data from the Industry Report is beginning to find the political decision makers.

Educated at Brunswick Tech,
Dennis started his Pattern
making apprenticeship at
Coburg's Woodstock Products - a
Patternmaking and Non-Ferrous
foundry who manufactured
tooling and produced moulds
and cores for shell moulds.

His official trade training occurred at what we knew and

loved for many years as RMIT. His passionate, dedicated and enthusiastic instructors encouraged our Dennis to attend evening lectures and work visits organised by the Victorian Foundry Industry leaders. Dennis pursued advanced foundry studies by correspondence from the city and guilds of London Institute in Patternmaking and Foundry work.

Dennis began his trade career with T Mains in 1960. 1962 saw the successful application of a Victorian Overseas Foundation Scholarship providing Foundry Industry working / study courses in the UK during 1965 – 1966.

Upon his return Dennis worked at John Valves – Ballarat until 1980. His career progressed from Methoding to Assistant Foundry Manager and Technical Manager. Dennis decided to return to patternmaking later in his career when he started a small Non-Ferrous Foundry - one of the products being the Patternmakers pronged letters and numbers.

In 1989 Dennis began training students at RMIT however after a short period due to dwindling student numbers the foundry school was closed. For 9 years after this until retirement approx. 4 years ago Dennis worked with A.W Bell - Dandenong - in their investment casting facility.

Dennis has always enjoyed visiting foundry's around Australia and overseas. His thirst for knowledge and vast years of experience makes him the perfect choice as the very first AFI Vic Historian. Dennis is looking forward to recording our Industry's history and is looking for input from our many members.

GOTafe Apprentice Training

GOTAFE is always looking for new ways that we can meet the needs of industry with training options that are relevant, flexible and deliver tangible results for both the student and relevant industry. Following on from meetings held in 2018 with GOTAFE, AFI Victoria, the Victorian Skills commissioner and several industry members it was decided that GOTAFE would apply for State Government Funding to assist in the setup of a new training program.

The funding application was successful and GOTAFE have been able to offer places for up to 15 apprentices this year. New training

resources are being developed and relevant equipment is being sourced to assist students with developing their skills including Virtual Reality training.

GOTAFE has now commenced training seven apprentices across three regional businesses, this has been a great start to the year with eight places remaining for students. If you are interested in putting on an apprentice, up to 50% off the normal fees applied for their training contact period for the eight training positions available if enrolled in 2019.

GOTAFE can assist your business with on the job training programs for all or part of the training contact. A customised Training Plan to suit your business needs will be developed before training commences.
