Soon after this National Council members met with Mark Goodsell National Manufacturing Manager, AIG) where we learned of

the changing winds in government re: sovereign capability. An "expression of interest" type letter was submitted to the CDIC (Centre for Defence Industry Capability) looking for opportunities for the AFI to work closely with them to help metal casting industries access this business. National Council met to explore how we can generate maximum leverage from this newly energised interest in manufacturing capability in Australia. Out of this we've begun to explore updating our website and creating promotional videos that will highlight our industries capabilities and attract a new workforce. Several of us joined an AIG organised webcast in early June that talked through the recommendations that the National COVID-19 Coordination Commission's manufacturing taskforce are working through. In relation to this, the Federal Govt will announce their actions in mid-June. This is a very important period for all manufacturing in Australia. Foundry In a Box

Over the last few months, John Zach - AFI Legend - has been quietly working at putting together our "Foundry In a Box." The following is a report on this project to date.....

Foundry In a Box is a collection of the basic ideas of founding (making a sand mould, melting and pouring metal, and, fettling the resulting casting), put together in a physical format; such, that it can be placed in a box, small enough to be carried by one person. This portable foundry concept has been designed to enable young people to experience the cast metal process, "hands-on". This activity has the prospect to enlighten and encourage future careers in our metal casting industry.

To put this together, materials and items were procured. These consisted of a small set of constructed wooden moulding "boxes"; a brass horse-belt badge used as the pattern; 20 mm diameter piece of dowel as a down-sprue; poly-set moulding sand; environmentally acceptable low temperature melting metal; steel ladle and a gas torch. The operation resulted in a recognisable cast item.









Next step is to refine the approach to make the procedure 'more user friendly' for youth appeal, and more acceptable as an educational tool.

We will look to a smaller pattern; items on a pre-method match plate using a smaller set of mould boxes, re-usable moulding sand, and a suitable, acceptable form of melting. This is a work in progress – watch this space!!

I first met David when he was Operations Manager at Eureka Tiles. At the time, I did not realise what a profound effect he was to have on my life. I found out very quickly that he was one of the most unique men I was to ever meet. He was very intelligent and methodical; I was astounded with the way he could solve the many complex manufacturing issues that we had at the time. He soon asked me to start helping him with this, unqualified as I felt, however his encouragement and guidance was invaluable, and I leant so much from him. After both leaving Eureka Tiles we kept in touch, he would regularly phone to see how I was travelling. He had always harboured a desire to have his own manufacturing business and one day he rang me and asked me to buy Grigsby's Foundry with him. After a lengthy period of persuasion, we did. I remember one of his comments at the time in reply to my asking what was the worst thing that could happen was "well, you could lose your house, but you can always buy another one". This was the way he looked at things, very pragmatic. He was a kind, gentle and caring man and had a great deal of empathy for others and was always concerned with every aspect of the wellbeing of our employees. Everyone was greatly saddened to hear of his untimely passing from a stroke in April and further compounded by our inability to pay our proper respects to him and to his wife Jill and children Christine and Hugh due to the current social restrictions. We will all miss him very much.



GoTafe Foundry Apprentice Training Update

As a result of a review of the Metal and Engineering training package MEM05 in June 2019 multiple changes have occurred. These changes however did not include the 9 Patternmaking electives required for GoTafe to train a Foundry Patternmaking Apprentice. Although originally supported by the Victorian Skills Commission these changes have now been opposed by VSC along with all other states training bodies. AFI(Vic) are currently meeting with GoTafe on a monthly basis to ensure all necessary actions are undertaken to ensure that GoTafe can continue to train Apprentice Patternmakers for the metal casting industry. We have recently been provided with a full set of training modules for the Moulding and Casting Apprenticeship. AFI(Vic) will review this material and provide feedback about their relevance and adequacy to GOTafe.

GoTafe are currently continuing to prepare the training modules for the Patternmaking apprenticeship in Qualification MEM30305 (the old qualification level) as we expect this qualification will continue to be offered beyond December 2020.
