This AFI Meeting will discuss the opportunities which are available to engage new young people in manufacturing by establishing a formal traineeship. These can also lead on to a traditional apprenticeship, which will also be covered.

We need new ways to get people interested in joining the manufacturing sector, and this is a good way to do it.

A W Bell will describe how, in mid-2019 they secured a State Government Grant to partner with a Registered Training Organisation to deliver a targeted course in Defence Manufacturing and Investment Casting.

Craig Hilton from the Ai Group will then talk about Higher Apprenticeship Development and how they work with the existing training system. You will have an opportunity to provide input on how the current system can work better and join a discussion on how the training systems might look in the future.

AFI(Vic) together with ADCA were fortunate to be able to tour the Stegbar Shower Screens and Wardrobes site on Wednesday 19th May. 24 participants viewed the steps taken along the Continuous Improvement and Lean Manufacturing journey at Stegbar. This was a "warts and all" tour, highlighting what has worked well and where the challenges remain. The tour was followed by a dinner and lengthy discussion / Q&A session which engaged all participants.

Foundry In A Box – (FiaB) Update – John Zach

Recently, had the opportunity to "road test" (more correctly – 'youth test') the Foundry in a Box concept at a Scout Patrol Activity Camp.

After the young volunteer had put on a dust coat, hand protection, and had the process explained to her, it was time to put words into action.

Results of the activity were rewarding in many ways, for it more than held the interest of both the youth and adults that were involved and witnessed, both the moulding and casting processes. Overall, it was a great success, and opportunities were identified for improvement.

Feedback was definitely encouraging, especially when you are told (second-hand) about a youth's parent questioning whether his daughter had actually produced the item that was shown to him. When given a full explanation, the parent stated, "where can I get a piece of the action".





INVESTING IN VICTORIAN MANUFACTURING AND JOBS

The Victorian Government is backing Victoria's manufacturers to continue to grow and lead the nation in manufacturing innovation and capability development. Victorian manufacturers can from today apply for grants of up to \$500,000 to support and expand their operations. GOTAFE Training Update

GOTAFE have been training in the area of Casting, Moulding & Patternmaking for over 18 months now. GOTAFE currently have 11 apprentices across the state undertaking its training program. In April this year GOTAFE launched a new delivery model where we conducted our first apprentice training classes at our new GOTAFE Broadmeadows campus.

As part of the three (3) days meeting, apprentices had an industry visit to AMAERO Additive Manufacturing in Notting Hill.

During their visit, they have participated in some group training and assessment activities and networking activities with other apprentices. This campus training opportunity was an invaluable medium for students enrolled in Certificate III qualification in Victoria to participate in group activities and meeting peers from different industries. The range of topics and activities covered in this meeting have enhanced the learner's current professional abilities and there Employers have expressed support for these types of on-campus training sessions to enhance their learning journey.

GOTAFE is currently finalizing the new Cert III in Casting and Moulding qualification ready for delivery in 2022. GOTAFE is also waiting for the new Cert III in Patternmaking qualification to be endorsed later in the year and will then looking at a July 2022 rollout of this new qualification.
